## THE BISHOPRIC'S MESSAGE

From these and other experiences, our families can learn order, patience, togetherness -- all things which will "influence each person toward increased righteousness and happiness". Isn't this what you want for your family? If you are not already doing so, hold your Family Home Evenings each and every Monday evening!! You'll be glad you did.
