Obedience and Sacrifice

The past couple of weeks many of our Young Men leaders have made some significant sacrifices of time, resources and effort by attending scout camps, not to mention the sacrifices made by wives at home holding down the fort. More sacrifice will come with girls' camp and trek later this summer.

Several Relief Society sisters in the ward sacrificed for a successful Super Saturday event.

Currently 8 people from the Willow Canyon 1st ward are serving the Lord full time in the work of saving souls. Families are making great sacrifices on their behalf.

A month ago a 5K race was sponsored by the Willow Canyon 1st ward. It was a great success due to the sacrifice of time and resources from many in the ward.

These are just a few examples of many sacrifices that our ward has made over its history, and this does not begin to account for some of the powerful spiritual blessings our ward has partaken of due to the sacrifices made on behalf of those who have had some incredible personal struggles.

Sacrifice is a very important aspect of the Lords plan for us. Pres. Hinckley said, "Without sacrifice there is no true worship of God." With the advent of the Savior the Law of Moses was fulfilled and blood sacrifices were no longer required. A new higher law was given. The Savior told the Nephites -

"And ye shall offer up unto me no more the shedding of blood; yea, your sacrifices and your burnt offerings shall be done away, for I will accept none of your sacrifices and your burnt offerings.

And ye shall offer for a sacrifice unto me a broken heart and a contrite spirit. And whoso cometh unto me with a broken heart and a contrite spirit, him will I baptize with fire and with the Holy Ghost, even as the Lamanites, because of their faith in me at the time of their conversion, were baptized with fire and with the Holy Ghost, and they knew it not."

(3 Nep. 9:19-20)

Elder Neal Maxwell said it well - "Real, personal sacrifice never was placing an animal on the altar. Instead, it is a willingness to put the animal in us upon the altar and letting it be consumed!" (" 'Deny Yourselves of All Ungodliness,' " Ensign, May 1995, 68).

When we are obedient to the Lord's ways and are willing to sacrifice our time, talents, and resources to building His kingdom, the plan works in our favor and we begin to understand how we can fulfill the full measure of our existence in this life and prepare to return to Heavenly Father with no regrets. Sacrifice allows us to obtain the inner strength we need to master ourselves. Elder Ballard in a talk to church educators related the following -

Brother Truman G. Madsen tells about a visit he made to Israel with President Hugh B. Brown, an Apostle of the Lord who served as both Second and First Counselor in the First Presidency. In a valley known as Hebron, where tradition has it that the tomb of Father Abraham is located, Brother Madsen asked President Brown, "What are the blessings of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob?" After a short moment of thought, President Brown answered, "Posterity."

Brother Madsen writes: "I almost burst out, 'Why, then, was Abraham commanded to go to Mount Moriah and offer his only hope of posterity?'

"It was clear that [President Brown], nearly ninety, had thought and prayed and wept over that question before. He finally said, 'Abraham needed to learn something about Abraham' " (The Highest in Us [1978], 49).

May we all be blessed with the spirit of obedience and sacrifice that will allow us to better understand ourselves and our relationship with the Savior. As we do so we will better understand what it means to offer a sacrifice of a "broken heart and contrite spirit."
